### **Family of North Vancouver shooting victim 'shocked'**

Rostam Poulad (Iranian ticket master) worked in the entertainment industry and was a well-known concert promoter. He was well-known in the Iranian community.

Last year, I produced a live program about the ticket master in my radio show (Golbang) in December 03- 2013, 3-4 pm; since, he was famous in Persian community. My show is a news story in Farsi for 5 minutes.

I talked with a journalism in the studio and one of Rostam's close friends on the phone about this news. I also reviewed this news in newspapers in Vancouver such as Vancouver Sun.

### **Details of my show**

“NORTH VANCOUVER, B.C. - Police have released the name of a man who was fatally shot in North Vancouver, B.C., but they're still looking for a motive.

An RCMP news release says the victim of Saturday's homicide was 69-year-old Rostam Poulad-Noshiravan.

The shooting happened on Saturday afternoon and prompted police to temporary close the two bridges that connect North Vancouver and Vancouver as they searched for a suspect.

The news release says Poulad-Noshiravan was not known to police and investigators are still working to determining a motive.

Why newspapers didn't like to write about the detail of this news. They just wrote short news about this important news in Persian community?

A grey or silver import-style car was spotted leaving the scene, and police are asking anyone with [information about](#) what happened to come forward.

It was the first homicide of the year of 2013 in North Vancouver.

Rostam Poulad-Noshiravan, 69, had lived on the 4000 block St. George Avenue in the Upper Lonsdale neighbourhood for more than 20 years, neighbours told CBC News. He had a wife and raised his family there, they said.

Sgt. Bari Emam, with the Lower Mainland's Integrated Homicide Investigation Team identified Poulad-Noshiravan as the homicide victim — North Vancouver's first in 2013 — and issued a plea for tips Sunday afternoon.

"Mr. Poulad-Noshiravan was not known to police," Emam said in a written statement. "The victim's family are shocked by this incident and also hoping that tips from the public and those who may know something can assist the investigators in getting some answers."

Witnesses in Poulad-Noshiravan's neighbourhood saw a vehicle speed away from the street after gunshots were heard, at approximately 1:18 p.m. PT.

Within minutes, police on the North Shore moved to begin shutting down traffic across both the Lions Gate and Ironworkers Memorial bridges in an attempt to apprehend the shooter. No suspects were located or arrested.

Emam said IHIT believes the suspect vehicle is either a grey or silver import-style car.

"Anyone who may have seen this car is urged to contact IHIT if they have more information about the car or its occupant(s)," Emam wrote.
