Note On The Program:

The Terry Project Podcast is a radio documentary program created at the University of British Columbia and aired on CITR 101.9 FM. Hosts Sam Fenn and Gordon Katic use a unique mixture of storytelling, interviews, and debates to connect important issues in the sciences and humanities to everyday experiences and personal stories. The past two years have taken us and our listeners to strange and powerful places: a UBC journalist travelled to Brazil to investigate deadly clashes over indigenous land which culminated in a national murder trial; a relationship coach revealed the lives of lonely urban men who are learning psychological tricks they believe will attract beautiful women; experts in micro-finance and rural development debated the benefits and flaws of high-interest loans; and a UBC student explains the emotional ride of being an international observer of the Arab Spring to defending a Sufi school with AK-47s in post-Gaddafi Libya. Each story is edited into an engaging and entertaining documentary with music, sound effects, and exposition, as well as context from leading experts. Past guests include Bill McKibben, Kim Campbell, Peter Klein, and George Strombolopolous.
